## Core Beliefs

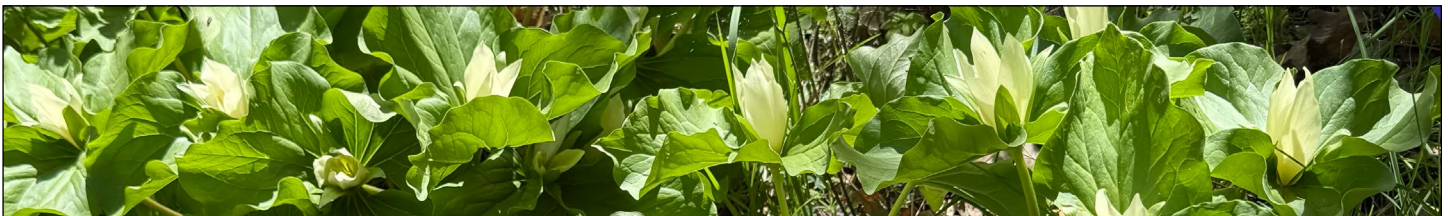
- » We have more in common than what separates us.


In short, it is a place for readers who want to support independent writers, to receive content of their choice, as well as the opportunity to comment, without the ads and algorithms that come with other media.



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



## Updates from presenters at May 19th & August 28th Community Forums

We are grateful for the presenters at our forums who gave their time to come out and provide current, accurate information and answer questions from the community. One aspect of our mission is to provide factual, locally relevant information against the backdrop of a rapidly changing legal and legislative landscape. Following are updates from some of our previous forum presenters.



**Allan Carver, [Siskiyou County Superintendent of Schools](#)**

The Siskiyou COE is excited to share that we recently partnered with Northern Humboldt Union High School District on a successful US Department of Education School Based Mental Health grant. The Siskiyou COE received notification that we were awarded \$1,346,000 to support three full-time positions. The grant period begins January 1, 2026, through December 31, 2029. We will be hiring three school psychologists to serve as Early Intervention and Intensive Support School Psychologists in accordance with the project plan. These staff members will be part of our School Based Mental Health Wellness program serving a variety of student needs.

We are moving forward in collaboration with College & Career Options, a local non-profit, on a competitive federal grant application. Gaining Early Awareness and Readiness

for Undergraduate Programs (GEAR UP) is a seven year grant award that supports students in 6th and 7th grades with college and career exploration through their first year out of high school. It is a very competitive grant, but one that would benefit numerous schools across Siskiyou County if we were to be awarded the funds.



**Dr. Char Perlas, President/Superintendent, [College of the Siskiyous](#)**

Currently, we have not received word of TRIO Upward Bound Program funding so we are proceeding as if we are funded. This is a federally funded, free college preparatory program designed to help high school students from low-income families and families where neither parent holds a bachelor's degree. It provides academic instruction, tutoring, counseling, and mentorship to prepare students for higher education, usually serving students in grades 9–12 through both academic-year support and summer sessions.

On a side note, our proposed Assembly Bill, (AB 1555 Hadwick, R-Alturas) authorizes the College of the Siskiyous to exempt certain students from nonresident tuition, including students who reside in nearby Oregon counties (Jackson, Josephine, and Klamath), was approved on Tue. March 17th by the applicable policy committee and will now move forward in the legislative process. It will allow us to offer non-resident tuition to up to 200 students living in these Oregon counties.

It has been a season of significant achievement for the Career and Technical Education (CTE) programs at College of the Siskiyous, marked by a prestigious statewide award and the revitalization of critical healthcare pathways.

**Statewide Honors for Siskiyous Fire Academy:** The Siskiyous Fire Academy recently received the Ronny J. Coleman Award for Academy of Excellence by State Fire Training. This honor, presented on March 18, 2026, recognizes the academy for its leadership, innovation, and commitment to producing high-quality graduates.

Furthering its mission to support rural healthcare, the college is reopening its LVN to RN Step-Up Program. Following approval from the Board of Registered Nursing (BRN), the program will relaunch in July 2026. This was made possible through curriculum revitalization and strong partnerships with local healthcare leaders at Fairchild Medical Center and Dignity Health.



**Steve Bryan**, Executive Director of the [Siskiyou County Community Resource Collaborative](#)

The resource centers have applied for and are waiting to hear if they were awarded a USDA Farmers Market Grant. This grant would help connect farmers to markets and training.

“Our food banks have had a tremendous uptick in usage. We are part of Feeding America now, so that has been helpful in stocking our pantries. Insurance has gone up with a lot of residents only enrolling in the lowest cost insurance plans, which means their deductibles will be a lot higher, and some dropping insurance all together.

We have had an uptick in LIHEAP applications (Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program; this program helps low-income people pay the cost of heating and cooling their homes.) which help offset their

costs, so they can afford insurance as well as utilizing our food pantries.”

**Jonathan Andrus**, CEO [Fairchild Medical Center](#)

The Fairchild Medical Center expansion remains on track for completion in 2027 and represents the most significant improvement to the facility since the hospital opened in 1997. With demand for local care rising, the project will nearly triple ED capacity and enhance critical services, reducing travel burdens for rural residents.

The mild winter allowed us to complete our steel superstructure in January. Exterior and Interior framing are now underway and our trades are beginning their systems’ overhead installations as well. April brings our long-awaited stairs and we are excited for our Topping Out Ceremony.

The FMC Expansion campaign continues to focus on ensuring that every resident has access to timely, life-saving care close to home. Donations directly support construction, technology upgrades, and improved patient experience—an investment in a healthier future for Siskiyou County. ## The Big Picture: Education

Despite the current administration making no secret regarding their desire to eliminate the Dept. of Education, there is only a relatively modest decrease of 2.9 percent in the budget over last year. Some of those cuts are being made to migrant and adult ed programs, as well as teacher preparation and technical assistance centers. Additionally, there are increases in funding for individuals with disabilities and Pell Grants . Funding for the latter is to rectify budget deficits, not an increase in services.

A second, and equally important factor is how the department is being reorganized, with there being currently 10 departments being outsourced to 5 other federal agencies.

Programming for school safety, academic supports, family engagement, Title I schools, and career and technical education are moving out of the Education Department under the interagency agreements. Donald Trump is working to dismantle the Education Department, but the relatively modest budget cuts proposed by the president show he can't get rid of the agency just yet.

The president is making a \$76.5 billion pitch to fund the agency for fiscal 2027 — a \$2.3 billion cut from fiscal 2026 enacted levels. That's a 2.9 percent decrease in discretionary funds.

Since the start of his second term, Trump has moved aggressively to eliminate the Education Department, cutting nearly half its staff and offloading programs to other federal agencies. But despite these efforts, closing the department requires the approval of Congress — a fact acknowledged by Education Secretary Linda McMahon and reiterated by lawmakers in the spending bill for the previous fiscal year.

The new budget request, a reflection of the president's priorities for federal education programs, makes a number of cuts, including an \$8.5 billion slash to K-12 programs and an elimination of \$2.7 billion in higher education programs. The array of cuts and consolidations comes as the Trump administration has struck deals to disperse the management of education programs across the federal government.

“The Budget puts the Department of Education which has failed the Nation's children, teachers, and families, on a path to elimination,” the White House said in the budget request. “The Budget advances efforts underway to dismantle the Federal education bureaucracy, including reducing ED's staff and transferring programs to other agencies that can deliver better results.”

But the request is not as stark as the previous year, when the president proposed only funding the agency at \$66.7 billion — a 15 percent slash. And despite efforts to dismantle the department, the budget proposal would maintain and boost funding for certain administration priorities, such as plugging the Pell Grant deficit and boosting funds to support students with disabilities.

A key proposal includes a \$10.5 billion boost for the federal Pell Grant, which is reserved for low-income students. The funding wouldn't increase the maximum financial aid award but instead serves as a patch for the program that is in jeopardy for the 2027-2028 school year. The program is

facing a \$5.4 billion shortfall for fiscal 2026 that's projected to balloon to \$11.5 billion in fiscal 2027, according to the Congressional Budget Office.

## **K-12**

Trump is seeking an \$8.5 billion slash to K-12 programs overall, while maintaining support for popular bipartisan programs such as funding for schools aiding students from low-income families and students with disabilities.

Twelve programs are on the chopping block, including initiatives to support English language learners, teacher preparation and technical assistance centers.

The budget calls for \$18.4 billion for Title I, which supports high-poverty schools, and \$500 million for charter schools. The president is also requesting nearly \$16 billion for the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act programs, a total increase of \$539 million. Like last year's pitch, the administration proposes the consolidation of a number of special education grants, which would give states more discretion on how they can spend the funding. Lawmakers rejected that proposal last fiscal year.

It also proposes \$2 billion for new Make Education Great Again grants, which would consolidate 17 existing programs that totaled \$6.5 billion. The new program would give states the flexibility to fund "activities based on their needs without Federal prescription." The MEGA grant proposal is similar to the consolidation Trump pitched in last year's budget that was also rejected by Congress.

"This overhaul of grant-making eliminates

the Department's ability to micromanage Federal funds intended for local communities, improves efficiency, cuts red tape for school districts, and reduces the Federal footprint," the proposal said.

## **Higher Ed**

Trump is proposing slashing funding for higher education programs by \$2.7 billion. Programs that support colleges with high enrollments of students of color are on the chopping block.

The president wants Congress to eliminate the Minority-Serving Institutions programs, which received more than \$350 million, because the Justice Department determined the programs to be unconstitutional.

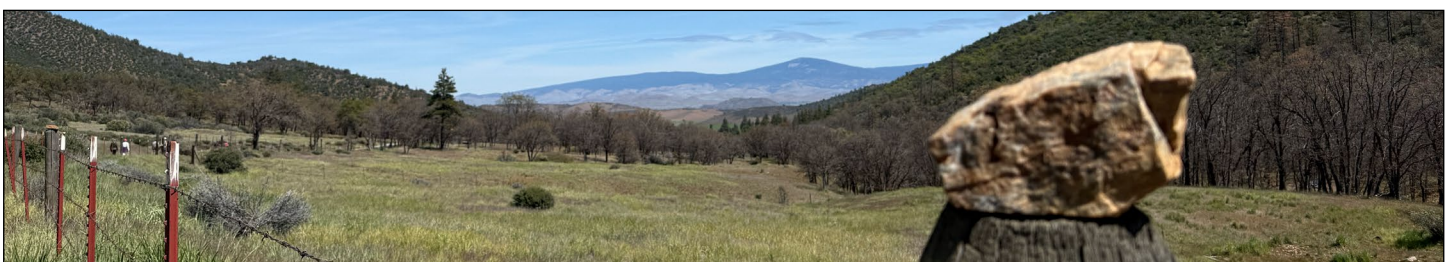
Trump also wants to cut \$81 million from International and Foreign Language Education programs, which the White House said "have funded woke and wasteful projects."

The president also recommended cutting \$1.5 billion from the Office of Career, Technical and Adult Education, the only agency office mentioned. The budget touted the interagency agreements between the Labor and Education departments to transfer career and technical education out of the education agency.

The proposal seeks to eliminate funding for Adult Education, which provides grants for adult English literacy and other education programs. The administration said the program "has inappropriately incentivized illegal immigration."

## The Bigger Picture



In recognition of the fact that larger, more systemic factors can and do have major local impacts that are not immediately apparent, **Dr. Dan Axelrod** has submitted the following article for consideration.

Of course, federal government cutbacks do not affect only local services; the cutbacks affect services and staffing over a wide range of communities. The National Forest Service (NFS) will be officially closing its research facility in Mount Shasta (which was already inactive), and also five other research facilities in California. These, and those in 30 other states, will be moved to a single research station in Fort Collins, Colorado. Such reshuffling likely leads to “voluntary” retirements and thereby a reduction in staff. Under billionaire Elon Musk’s tutelage, the Dept. of Governmental Efficiency (DOGE) already had outright-fired about 3400 NFS employees last year. Such staff reductions directly impact trail maintenance, campground maintenance, many other services, and possibly wildfire preparedness. All nine of the regional NFS offices (one step above the District Ranger Offices) will be closed, with their operations to be consolidated in places hundreds or thousands of miles away. Inconsistent messaging within the NFS has left many employees with a lack of clarity about their futures.

Civilian-oriented federal spending on scientific research is being slashed in the 2027 proposed budget. Both the National Science Foundation (NSF) and the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) are slated to be cut by more than 50%. The EPA already has lost more than 4000 employees, a 24% reduction, in just the first year of the current administration. The EPA’s new leadership now says that it doesn’t need to regulate greenhouse gases under the

Clean Air Act anymore, and will be pulling back regulations meant to curb emissions specifically from cars and trucks. The budget for the National Institutes of Health, the nation’s main source for funding basic medical research, is slated for a 13% cut. However, applied research funding for the Department of Defense (aka, War) (DOD) will increase. The preference for weapons (as opposed to civilian) funding is part of a proposed increase of 40% to the DOD, up to \$1.5 trillion. And more: any not-yet-budgeted amounts seen as needed to destroy Iran’s physical infrastructure, people, and civilization (currently estimated to be about \$200 billion) is in addition to the \$1.5 trillion. The misnamed “America First” priorities of the federal government (and its corporate financial and military industry billionaire backers) are clear, and are not to the advantage of ordinary working Americans.

At the border between scientific research and public safety lie the federal agencies responsible for predicting and reacting to natural disasters. The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), which funds both the Weather Service and climate change research, has been slated for a \$1.6 billion cut. The reason given is that NOAA has “consistently funded efforts to radicalize students against markets.” (Presumably, this refers to efforts that might advocate public funding to help ameliorate climate change problems.) Progress in meteorology, the basic science behind weather and climate forecasting, will be hard hit with the proposed complete dismantling of the National Center for Atmospheric Research. Cutbacks have already occurred in the schedule of balloon launches, and, according to some professional meteorologists, this has already decreased the accuracy of tornado prediction in the Great Plains region. According to the California State government, the 2027 federal proposed budget significantly cuts back the

state and local preparedness grant programs of the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). It also eliminates the Next Generation Warning System Grant Program, which supports local public media efforts to provide emergency alerts and warnings to the public, including rural areas.

## Every Action Counts

The Siskiyou Community Alliance is happy to continue a regular feature in our newsletter: **Every Action Counts**. This column will highlight local residents and organizations who are engaged in activities that support the democratic thriving of all members of our community, both locally and globally.



### Siskiyou Housing Alliance:

The Siskiyou Housing Alliance began 3 years ago with two community meetings, called to assess and discuss housing issues in Siskiyou County. A core group of eight began meeting on a regular basis and in 2025 obtained non-profit status with the mission of "Creating solutions for permanent, affordable workforce housing in Siskiyou County, specifically for residents essential to the community".

Besides engaging in organizational and collaborative work, a long term focus is to hold land in trust with the formation of a Community Land Trust, to provide permanently affordable access to land and housing for Siskiyou County residents.

### **What exactly is a Community Land Trust (CLT)?**

A classic CLT is an independent community-controlled non-profit that owns and "stewards" land, ensuring that land and housing is being used to support the community it is accountable to.

A CLT stratifies property ownership into two pieces - the dwelling, and the land it sits on. Homes are owned by individuals or families, and land is owned by the trust, of which the residents are voting members. The home is tied to the land by a long-term, low-cost lease. The effects of this are that the land and structure can be deed restricted, and income criteria and resale formulas can be tied to them in perpetuity. The end result is that housing stays under local control, and remains

affordable. Community land trusts have been successfully initiated all over the country since the very first in rural Georgia, 60 years ago.

"Siskiyou Housing Alliance is a "grassroots" effort, run by locals to ensure that those essential to our communities can afford to live and thrive here. We are seeking members, specifically individuals with legal, organizational, or financial backgrounds as well as grant writers", says SHA Director, Evan Drake. ### **Know Your Rights Workshop**

A Know Your Rights workshop pertaining to immigration law was held at the Weed Community Resource Center on Friday February 20th. It was attended by over 75 people from a variety of backgrounds and was facilitated by Carla Charraga, a local activist for the Latinex community. It was translated into Lao and Spanish in real time by Carla and Phetsamone Jenny Virasonh, local business owner and Weed City Council member.

The information presented was detailed and useful. The difference between a judicial and administrative warrant, what you are obligated to do and should not do if stopped or detained, what rights agents have to enter your property or your home (none, without a signed, judicial warrant), and situations particular to schools

and places of employment were just some of the topics discussed.

Observers' rights were also reviewed. It is a First Amendment right to film ICE and federal officials performing duties in public spaces, as long as the observer does not physically interfere with or obstruct operations. Agents **cannot** confiscate your phone without an order.
